She's been on the front line as GNO has grown from a small house off Meridian Road into an operation with 47 affordable housing units, an 11-bed prison transition house and a food operation that provided 9,115 bags of groceries for 19,664 people last year.

Maggie played an important role in the food service as a delivery driver for the Aenon Church route. Monthly, on the second Sunday, Maggie delivers groceries to people on her route. I rode

with her in December. She is much more than just a driver. She makes a lasting impact while building relationships.

People break into smiles and call her name when she arrives. Over the years, she and some friends have gathered Christmas gifts for some of the families with children under age 12.

Difficult fight ends for former housing director

Jeff Hornsby, 57, our housing director for nearly 10 years ending in 2019, passed away Dec. 3. He was never known for his service to the forgotten." homeless and poor.

His work was rooted in his leagues and faith and through Bible studies at Global University, there for him, an online Pentecostal, Christian college based in Springfield, Mo.

Good News Outreach noted his leadership with this Facebook post: "Jeff Hornsby faithfully served the families and children at Good News Outreach's Maryland Oaks Crossing Community for many years. He loved God and loved serving our clients, many of whom regarded Jeff as a father figure. Jeff was one of a kind and his memory is carried in the hearts of many of those he served. Jeff's contributions to Good News Outreach are immeasurable. We will forever be grateful and he will be missed - but

Jeff's colfriends were too, when he needed help. He was diagnosed with cancer in 2017.

Wade Case of the Chapman Community Health Program, which serves Maryland Oaks Crossing, set up a GoFundMe account to help with Jeff's medical and living expenses since he had no insurance. The fund quickly surpassed its \$5,000 goal. Upon his death, anything left in the account was to go to Chapman and Maryland Oaks Crossing.

Case said this in a message with the account: "I



am fortunate to have met such an advocate for humanism. Through his willingness and support, CCHP has accomplished insurmountable success at caring for the underserved. Every day, Jeff gives all his effort and all his love to the Maryland Oaks Crossing community, Good News Outreach, and beyond."

Jeff requested donations for The Blessing Cup of Tallahassee, Inc. 7970 Glenarbor Court, 32309-9221 to help the elderly poor.
